If 2020 taught us anything, it's that we never know what the future holds but if we **expect a miracle** we will get one. Every day since March 2020 our team and those we work to keep safe never knew what the next restriction, roadblock or symptom would be. People all over the world began to worry about their health, their children and their futures. These are the same worries and fears that many of the families coming to stay with WCS have been facing for years.

The COVID-19 pandemic cast a shadow over our ability to remain hopeful. Parents had to make the heart-wrenching decision between staying in an unsafe home or leaving to stay in a shelter, where the fear turned from their abuser to a virus. Living through the COVID-19 crisis has had a serious impact on us all, but especially those who need a shelter for safety. We saw new tactics of power, control and isolation happen within these families.

WCS never closed our doors and continued to persevere and keep individuals and families fleeing abuse safe. We remained hopeful and miraculously the shelter and our programs were able to continue to be a stable and consistent reprieve for those who had nowhere to turn during the most uncertain time in recent history.

PANDEMIC RESPONSE 2020/2021

The Wheatland Crisis Society has and continues to remain dedicated to helping all people experiencing abuse. Due to public health regulations our capacity has been temporarily reduced but together with our team and public health partners, WCS has remained adaptable and nimble during these uncertain times. Just a few of the changes that were made to be able to continue to offering programming are:

*Number of available bedrooms for individuals and families fleeing abuse post March 2020

Number of available bedrooms for individuals and families fleeing abuse prior to March

- ENSURED TESTING WAS AVAILABLE ON AND OFFSITE
- INCREASED & MANDATED SANITATION AND PPE USAGE
- BROUGHT IN ADDITIONAL SUPPORT FOR FOOD PREP & SANITATION
- CREATED UNIQUE & ADAPTIVE NEW SPACES FOR CHILDREN TO PLAY
- MET & EXCEEDED ALL OF AHS PUBLIC HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

*WCS will return to prior capacity when public health guidelines allow shelters to resume normal operations



PROJECT IMPACT 2020/2021

In 2020, 21 shelters across the province were assembled by the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters to define and evaluate their impact and respond to what they discovered in the data. *This research project found 7 key findings in the impact of the work that WCS does.* These findings will be used to improve the way we collect data and statistics to help WCS, and shelters across the province acheive our goals, vision and mission.

- Clients know self-care will keep them strong and help them through the difficult times. They will make time for themselves.
- Clients have the tools that they need to help them to accept that it is okay to not be okay.
- Clients are able to build a space where they can trust people to be kind and caring.
- Clients learn to trust themselves to recognize and respond to the things that pose a threat to them.
 - Clients understand the importance of being and unconditional safe person for their children.
- Clients have a network who support them and believe in them and they know they are resourceful and will seek help when needed
- Clients have built a learned language of empowerment that they use to reframe lived experiences and shape who they are.
